This year's Lebanon Train Show was a great event! Some quick numbers for the show: we had around 560 people attend the train show and we sold 164 tables. We had several operating layouts. Trevor Jones brought his new Transylvania layout that he has been showing off at the last couple of modeler's meets. If you haven't attended one to see it, it is worth seeing him unload and load it up as it folds onto itself. CinTrak brought both their larger module as well as the T-Track layout. One of the modules is of the Bates Motel, with the scene modeled in black and white. It was very interesting to see!

And of course we had several of the most awesome people at the train show our volunteers. David Nance handled this show completely on his own this year after learning the ropes from Jim Shellhaus last year. A HUGE thank you to Jim for leading this show for multiple years and making the hand off easy to Dave. The CID recently purchased new table cloths which provide a much more professional look to the booth, along with the new signs we purchased last year. The CID settings have received some much needed and noticed spit and polish.



The show nicely filled both buildings with ample room for people to move around. Those larger aisles also provided a unique opportunity for the Purdue Model Railroad Club. I mentioned in the Banks' Statement that we donated to the club, but what I didn't mention was the size of the group! There were 11 current and past members.

Coming back for a visit was Alex, the previous club president. Alex went on to graduate and not only keep modeling, but go to work for the South Shore railroad. Back to that opportunity, you will notice the ½ scale locomotive in the group photo. Normally you would find that on a 71/4 inch gauge railroad. Spencer, the club president, built it and there isn't a lot of track around the Purdue campus so he improvised. Spencer wanted an ATV style locomotive so he attached 6 skateboard trucks into groups of 3, motorized them, and powered the whole thing via battery. What you get is a locomotive that you can ride on, but requires you to lean to the side when you want to turn. We had a great time with the club at this show!

We also handed out plaques for the contest season this past fall and we kicked off this season with a MOW theme. We had great entries but one modeler really brought his game by bringing in 9 entries, a whole MOW train! Eric Peterson's O scale models created a lot of conversation show attendees.

We had families. A LOT of families! We had a father, son, and grandkids make the trip up from Evansville. It was a long drive for them but the kids (of all ages) really enjoyed the show. We had a lot of local families show up as well. While we market to an email list and send info for all shows, it is much of our local advertising that brings in families to the local for them show. We get to meet hundreds of families each year. It's always a great way to promote the hobby while picking up some good deals. We give out some great advice to beginner model railroaders as well as answer the questions of more experienced modelers.



The main CID booth is always busy and serves as the nervous system of the show. Door prizes are given away there. This year's winners were Tim Hedge, Bill Baetz, David Buffington, and Dona Heater. While the primary booth is certainly busy, the CID maintains a secondary booth area on the opposite side of the building entrance. This is where you can find the contest table, the Inglenook Layout, and the test track. The Inglenook continues to be a huge hit with kids and adults alike. The test track is often a surprising area to work. You get to see some incredible stuff come to you for testing but it goes beyond just putting the loco on the track to see if it runs. You get a chance to talk to the people and show them how the loco runs over a range of speed, including the counter-intuitive fact of how well it runs at slow speed. Any model that runs will do well at high speed but does it run smoothly at a crawl. It's a chance to educate buyers and help them find some real gems and some possible troubleshooting when the testing doesn't quite go as well as it hoped.



### JOHN'S JUNCTION by John Robert Coy, MMR #730

This is the 10th installment in a series of articles involving the Achievement Program (AP). (AP Master Builder-Motive Power)



We, your CID Board, are following a NMRA directive: "Whenever possible, Division events should include a short reminder about the AP..."

This 1st area of the AP is considered by most to be the most intimidating. That is due to the requirement of scratch-building either a rail car or motive power. Thus far we have had two (2) people in the last few years earn this motive power certificate: Dan Hinel and Phillip Burnside.

To qualify for the Master Builder - Motive Power certificate:

1) Build three scale models of railroad motive power, one of which must be scratch built. Motive Power is defined as a locomotive or a self-propelled vehicle.

To qualify as scratch built, the motive power must contain the following scratch built items as applicable:

- Steam Locomotives: frame, boiler, cab, tender frame and body, either valve gear or main and side driving rods.
- Other Motive Power: body, frame, cab, power truck side frame, pantograph or trolley poles where appropriate.

All models must be capable of self-propulsion on track of the same gauge as the model. Power trains for all models may be commercial motors and gears.

All models must be <u>super detailed</u> either with scratch built parts or with commercial parts as defined in the <u>Definitions Section</u>.

Please read these online <u>www.nmra.org/</u> motive-power

The following parts are specifically excluded from the scratch built requirement.

- Motor
- Gears
- Drivers and wheels
- Couplers
- Light bulbs and electronics
- Trucks
- Paint, decals, etc.
- Bell
- Marker and classification lights
- Brake fittings
- Basic shapes of wood, plastic, metal, etc.

("Basic shapes are things that builders of the prototype would have used as raw materials. For example an "I" beam would be a basic shape; a commercial door or window casting would not.)

The term "scratch built" implies that the modeler has done all of the necessary layout and fabrication that produces the final dimensions, appearance, and operating qualities of the model.

This is a good statement of the intent and spirit of the "scratch built" requirement. Notice that it does not say that the use of a few commercial detail parts will disqualify the model as being "scratch built". In general, the same standard applies that is used in contest judging: "Completely Scratch built" means that 90% or more of the model by parts count was scratch built. (But you do need to scratch build the items listed in requirement above.)

Taking an existing model and modifying it to be a powered model is not considered "scratch building." Examples of this would be taking a passenger car and converting it into a trolley, or a box car and converting it into a box-cab locomotive. These do not meet the definition or the spirit of the term "scratch built" given above.

2) Earn a Merit Award of at least 87.5 points with each of the three scale models of motive power either via an NMRA sponsored contest or AP Merit Award Evaluation.

3) You must submit a Statement of Qualification (SOQ, see below) which includes the following:

> An attachment giving a detailed description of each model, including:

> > Identification of all scratch built fea-

All commercial components used Materials used in building the model Copies of the plans you used to establish conformity are NOT required, but many people do submit them, and they are reviewed by the person evaluating the model.

**Verification of the Merit Awards** (photocopies of the certificates).

Photos of the model are helpful, but not reauired.

The motive power will be challenging and educational. Here is an opportunity to build that locomotive that you have always wanted that no manufacturer produces.

In addition, you have two CID Members who have both successfully earned this certificate that you may ask for information and guidance.

Good luck on your motive power project!



# WHAT GOES BANG IN THE MIDDLE OF THE NIGHT?

One night last June I was awakened by a very loud boom. I believe I awakened at about an altitude of 1 ft above the mattress. After realizing the noise was thunder from a lightning strike I spent some time wandering about the house looking for any signs of damage and found none by sight or smell. During a tour in Viet Nam I slept in a tent about 100' from a battery of 105mm howitzers. They fired all night, every night but were quiet by comparison!

During the following morning I discovered a roof vent that had been hit and collapsed upon itself from the heat, also found 2 damaged flat screen TVs, a video/audio tuner, and DVD player. My wife Sandy and I also smelled gas in the house. I called our Insurance carrier, USAA, to find out how to proceed. We have been with them since 1963 and they have always been great to deal with when having a claim. They said to get your contractors out ASAP and send us the bills. So, we wound up with a roofer, electrician, three plumbers and a large bill from Best

Abot the gas smell, we were told that after a relatively short time most folks no longer smell the gas so do nothing about it! That was our response and it took three plumbers, the first being useless, the second and third who found 7 leaks in the gas piping around our furnace, water heater, and fireplace. Thank God that we do not smoke and rarely light a candle! That probably saved our home and lives.

This is where CID comes in, especially during the time after the lightning strike, while working on my layout principally with Bill Kennedy that I was plagued with a series of malfunctions of my Digitrax controls. I contacted six CID members searching for clues as to what my operational issues might be. While all were helpful, most including myself thought I had wiring issues. Bill and I kept searching for them with little success. It was not until recently that a fix made by Dan Hinel failed and a swap of components from another section of the layout failed also.

On many occasions Bill mentioned that he suspected damage from the lightning strike but we had no evidence to prove that. I went back to USAA with the story and they agreed to reopen my claim. They informed me that they had a firm they used to examine cases like this and that they would send a technician out to examine the layout. The tech came and concluded that the damage was consistent with electronics enduring a jolt of High Voltage consistent with a lightning strike. He reviewed the costs of replacing all of the Digitrax equipment in a report to USAA. The day after they received his report they transferred the funds to satisfy replacement to my checking account.

Yesterday, Bill and I reinstalled the components in one section and shazam! It came back to life!

# The CID Marks the Passing of Roger Hensley

RIP, Roger Hensley

There are many labels that fit Roger Paul Hensley, including train enthusiast, model railroader, media specialist, association leader and servant, railroad historian, beloved family man, and "all round good guy". Other labels apply, too, but any extended listing could fill several pages.

The CID was saddened to learn that Roger Hensley passed on February 13, 2025. He was born in Anderson, Indiana in 1939. He married the love of his life, Lynn, in 1970 and they had 9 children. A U.S. Navy veteran from the Cold War era, Roger later worked at Delco Remy and IBM, did technical consulting, worked at Ball State's Office of Career Services, and was the owner of the Train Shop (a local hobby store). In recent years, he spent many hours volunteering at the Madison County Historical Society where he tended to the numerous train layouts in their basement.

A long-time member of the NMRA, Roger was a Division officer, Editor of The Rusty Spike, and an active clinician. His East Central Indiana Railway home layout was featured on multiple layout tours over the years. He was a CID Board member and served as the sole CID webmaster for 22 years. He helped organize Midwest Regional Conferences held in central Indiana and elsewhere over the years.

Directly linked to Roger's career in information technology, his association contributions involved bringing the CID / MWR / NMRA into the Digital

Era. The 1980s were a period when computers entered business settings, then home computers became more popular by the end of the decade. By the 1990s, a global network called the World Wide Web changed work, leisure, and the hobby of model rail-roading. Digital cameras, DCC systems, and electronic commerce also began to flourish about this time.

Roger was the initial webmaster of the Central Indiana Division. He designed and maintained the CID's platform, one that included digital images, educational features, and news about the association and hobby. Ever the historian, Roger archived media on the website so that everyone had access to modeling resources. The Central Indiana Division was on the Internet by 1995, and it is believed to be the first such platform among the NMRA's divisions and regions. Fellow modelers around the nation were impressed with Roger's efforts and he quickly became involved in regional and national tasks (even serving on the initial NMRA Standards & Recommended Practices Committee starting back in the 1990s). A Google search will take you to numerous articles still found on NMRA-linked websites, such as discussions about the weight calculations for rolling stock and other policies. The CID website itself had 70,000+ page views a year in the mid-2010s.

As mentioned, Roger's career and hobby pursuits aligned with the advent of the Web. He participated in numerous Internet chat rooms, discussion forums, and websites as they were launched and then flourished. Roger's professional and detailed information, and positive feedback, all helped promote the hobby he loved. Numerous posts are still archived on sites such as TrainOrders.com, the oncepopular RailServe.com site, and in the Bull Session forum at IndianaRailroad.org. Rarely a day ever went by without Roger adding new postings about trains, models, or NMRA activities.

Roger grew-up in a black-and-white photograph era, and he had an impressive collection of B&W prints and slides of trains in and around Indiana. Fortunately for fellow railfans, he digitized his archives and shared them as JPEG files for easy access via emails or Internet sites. A joy of his was describing those images during talks and clinics; he knew every detail about the steam and diesel locomotives, the businesses serviced by rail, and the national rail networks. His passion for the topics always shown through during his talks.

Always a promotor of the Big 4 railroad line and the

local impact of the modern-day CSX line in Madison County, Roger helped found the "By Air / By Rail" festival in the mid-2000s. The event ran several years in the community of Fortville. This summertime event was quite popular, drawing attention to trains and model railroading (plus airplanes!) at a new time of the annual calendar for modelers and transportation enthusiasts.

Roger was an important member of the New York Central Historical Society, and his work was featured in many publications. He was respected for his knowledge and was a true fountain of information. As expected, many NYC artifacts hung on the walls of his layout room; other memorabilia filled binders and shelves. Again, by collecting images and sharing them in digital form, his resources were routinely sought by interested parties from across the nation.

Perhaps the best memories of our colleague Roger Hensley involve his warm smile (refer to Roger's photograph!) and friendly conversations at meets, clinics, conventions, and via e-mail. He was always the polite, passionate friend who shared interesting stories and useful information. He loved his family, community, our hobby, and fellow modelers. His vision for how to share resources and promote rail-roading (both prototype and scale operations) was greatly appreciated. Rest in peace, dear friend!

# Roger Scroggins

#### To all CID members:

My name is Roger Scroggins and I am asking for your vote for Trainmaster. My fascination with trains began as a little kid watching the GM&O mail car snatching the mail at speed in Brighton, Illinois. I was hooked. I've been involved in our hobby since 1967 when my brother and I received our first figure 8 trainset for Christmas. After moving to Indiana in 1986, plans began immediately to build my dream layout in the basement of our new house. I designed and built a freelanced 16 x 24 HO layout that worked pretty well. During that time my wife Beth and I raised two girls and lived to tell about it. We

moved to Westfield almost 7 years ago and that provided an opportunity for a new layout in a bigger space. A few hundred hours later I'm the proud operator of the Indiana Division of the Union Pacific Railroad in a 17 x 40 layout room in my basement. # Carmel Clay Historical Society - Diorama

Cows in Downtown Carmel? It is hard to imagine today with the coffee shops, restaurants and pedestrian greenway that cattle did go off to market from the Heart of Carmel.



Visitors to the Carmel Clay Historical Society's (CCHS) new museum and restored 1883 Monon Railroad Depot will be able to glimpse what Carmel looked like nearly 100 years ago. In a combined effort between the CCHS and the Central Indiana Division of the NMRA a new diorama is now on public display in the Depot.

This project came to life in March 2021 when I proposed the idea of constructing a museum quality diorama to CCHS Executive Director Deb Gangstad. Deb was excited about the idea and successfully procured grant funding for the project. The design was focused on the CCHS commissioned artwork by Frank Vietor based on the early 1930's. Vietor's painting depicts a mostly accurate scene of a Monon Railroad steam locomotive northbound at the Depot.

Utilizing track diagrams from the Monon Railroad Historical and Technical Society a track and structure plan was developed. Photos from CCHS's collection helped fill in details. Every business and structure presented in the diorama serviced the agricultural community of Carmel. Due to space limitations the size of the buildings were compressed to fit into the two by six foot Depot Business District. The grain elevator and bulk fuel dealer locations were swapped to create a viewblock of trains entering the scene.

In addition to the funding to this project by the CID Board CID members provided assistance to the success of the project.



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
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
